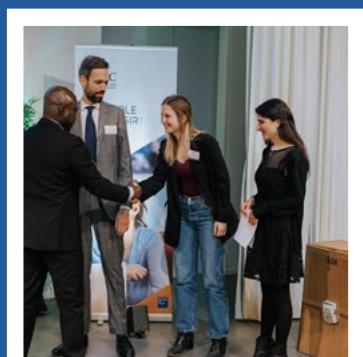
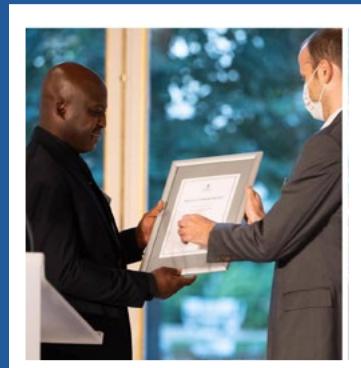

This paper studies the effect of inter-entrepreneurial productivity variation on investment under asymmetric information and signalling in the credit market. When productivity is not sufficiently dispersed, safe-type entrepreneurs face borrowing constraints and might under- or overinvest relative to the social optimum. Reversals in the order of productivities cause large fluctuations in investment and output. Better economic conditions, expansionary monetary policy, and decreases in default probabilities do not always boost investment and welfare. When the model is extended to allow for endogenous occupational choice, would-be safe-type entrepreneurs might inefficiently select to become work “r”s.

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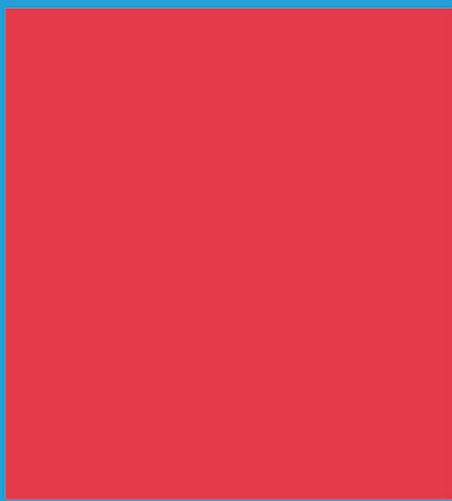
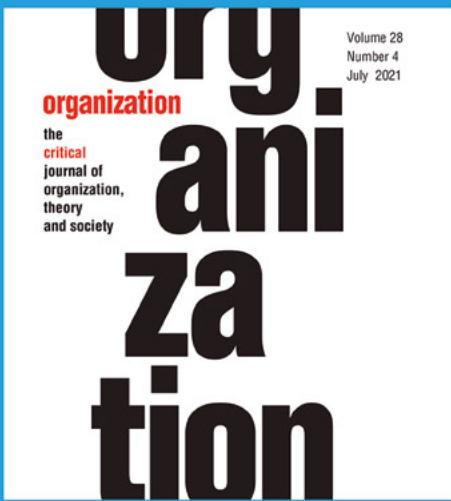

Lost in translation? Transferring creativity insights from arts into management

Abstract

In the early 2000s the business sector has, as a matter of both professional and academic concern, repeatedly advocated the transfer of artistic practices, especially those deemed exemplary forms of creativity, to a management world grappling with new challenges – a claim we here call the ‘transferrability thesis’ in order to consider the responses made to what Boikanski and Chapello define as an artistic critique of capitalism. Drawing on the wide range of relevant academic literature, this article critically examines the plausibility of the ‘thesis’. To this end, we review analytical literature advocating artistic transfers alongside empirical work that examines art interventions within organizations. Both are important components of a broader organizational aesthetics approach even though, we contend, neither strand of research provide a plausible argument for meaningful transferrability. We then draw on arts-based literature, management theory and psychology to compare notions of creativity at both ends of the proposed transfor-

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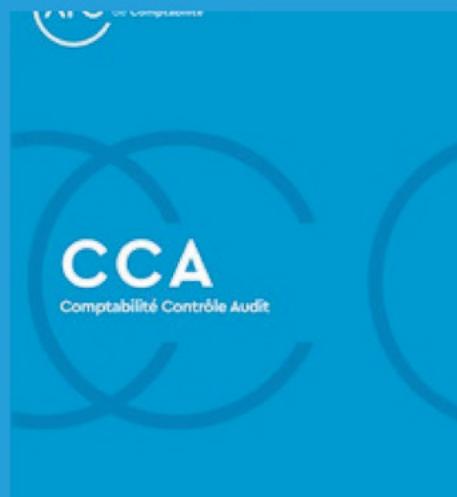

Management control research has long highlighted the “human aspects” of the discipline, which distances it from a common and narrow conception focusing on technical aspects alone (for a review studies on the subject, see Langevin and Naro, 2003, for example). This human and social dimension so important that it is often considered to be the very foundation of the discipline, with behavioral orientation being placed at the heart of most definitions of management control. This centrality of the human dimension of management control has led to incursions into the field of psychology, and particularly into work psychology. Notable examples include research drawing on motivation theories (e.g. recently, Godener and Fornerino, 2017) or organizational justice theories (Langevin and Mendoza, 2013). On the other hand, there has been very little research bringing social psychology into play—see Orlitz (2004) for an exception. However, this branch of psychology has paid particular attention to the notion of control, to such an extent that a sub-field in its own right, sometimes called the “psychology of control” (in French: psychologie du contrôle, Dubois, 1987), has emerged. By conducting a deep analysis of people’s psychological relationships with situations that (or others) control, this sub-field holds significant promise for the discipline of management control. In the first instance, it expands its prevailing “objectivizing” perspective by shedding light on the more subjective aspects of managers’ control over their performance (as shown below in Part I).

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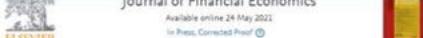

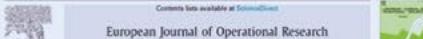

ABSTRACT

Uncertainty with respect to future investment horizons who rebalance their portfolio at the monthly frequency. Should they use information from monthly returns, 10-year returns or intermediate returns to build their optimal portfolios? When short and long horizons are used, the frequency of returns is set without loss of generality. We show that the positive impact of predictability on investment welfare is increased when long-term returns are used. In addition, we show that the positive impact of predictability is achieved by shifting realistic portfolio positions. While we confirm for the persistence of the positive impact of predictability on investment welfare, we also show that it is robust to changes in medium investment horizons although the added value of long horizon predictability is reduced. Our results are robust to various choices and also hold out-of-sample. Overall, short to medium term investors should not ignore long horizon predictability even though they implement static portfolios at high frequency.

Hypotheses are tested on a sample of 21 European and North American countries over a 20-year period. Results indicate that economic development has a positive effect on management consulting expenditures, while uncertainty avoidance has a negative effect. What Keeps Corporate Volunteer Engaged: Extending the Volunteer Work Design Model with Self-determination Theory Insights

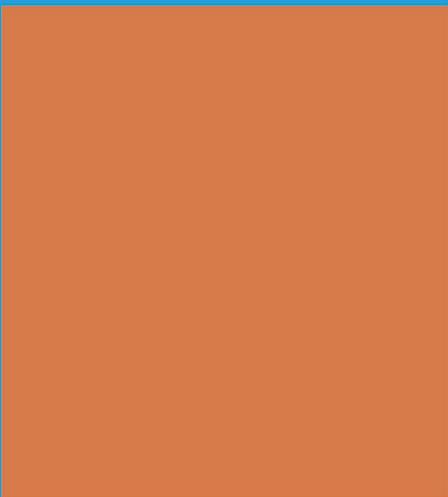
